### Fear and Chaos

"In the beginning God made heaven and earth. And the earth was invisible and unformed; and darkness was upon the abyss, and the Spirit of God was rushing upon the water." Genesis 1:1-2

The opening verses of the Bible start with darkness and a watery abyss. Some translations use the word chaos. This image is meant to be slightly unsettling. In some ancient cultures expanses of water represented the frightening forces beyond our control. Later in the gospels, even seasoned fishermen were unnerved when Jesus fell asleep during a storm in a boat on the Sea of Galilee. In the ancient mind, all manner of demons and uncontrollable evil was believed to lurk in the waters, which I also think was a metaphor for wider fears in society. Fear of chaos has been a powerful motivator over the centuries for people in power, with myths and propaganda used to stoke those fears. After the end of the book of Genesis, the Egyptian fear of Hebrew immigrants was used as a justification for Hebrew enslavement and their mass murder.

The book of Genesis probably reached the final written form we know today during the time of the Babylonian empire, around 600 BCE. The Jewish people, defeated and exiled, might have started to believe the propaganda that Babylonian dominance was for their greater good and that the other defeated nations had been part of the chaos which needed to be brutally suppressed. When those who are oppressed start to believe that they deserve that treatment this is called internalised oppression. But the

opening verses of Genesis reminded them that, at the very beginning, the symbolic chaos of the watery abyss, far from being the sum of their worst fears, was the place where the Spirit of God was moving, even rushing, in the work of creation.

Today we too are encouraged to worry about chaos and threats that might be about to overwhelm us. Whether these are the threats of small boats, cyclists on the road, or gender identity issues, we are at risk of being manipulated by powerful voices stoking up fears. Fears as simple as these can be used to justify a lack of basic human kindness, or even the loss of our own human rights. Jesus told his disciples that perfect love casts out fear.

So let's be like the Hebrew exiles. Let's remember our foundation stories in the Bible. Let's remember the saviour Jesus whose willing death on the cross, the ultimate Roman sanction against the forces of chaos, can set us free from the ultimate fear of death. Instead of allowing ourselves to be divided by our fears, let's be encouraged that at the beginning of creation, the watery chaos was the very place where the Holy Spirit was involved in an act of creation, so incredible that it is beyond our understanding!

# Country Notes by Iain Malin from Canada



The year is flashing by and we are now halfway through. Soon it will be harvest time around Wing, school holidays, and it will seem as though the year has gone. Of course it hasn't, but the flowers will be setting seed and most of the birds will have finished breeding unless they are multibrooded. Summer migrants will begin their moult so that they are in pristine condition to wend their way slowly through France, Spain and over the straits of Gibraltar to their wintering grounds. This is done at a much gentler pace than the spring migration - as any mum or dad would say, what do you expect with kids in tow!

In Canada, crops have just been sown and we are still praying for rain as usual. Where I am at the moment, and I may have mentioned this before, we are on the same latitude approximately as Madrid. Consequently, summers are hot if not somewhat short. We have just had a spell of 300C+ and currently average about 250C.

Things have moved fast on the nature front. The trees are now all in leaf!!! Yes, and all the summer migrants are now here although numbers are low for some. Breeding is now at full speed, although the curious thing is there is little bird song, such as around Wing. By that I mean a dawn chorus and it is easy picking out individuals. Consequently, on my daily trips out I spend my time looking for movement in the trees rather than listening for bird song. However it doesn't help that my hearing is not so good these days.

Here we seem to be going through a period where the dominant colour is yellow. There are 37 warbler species that come to breed in Canada, 18 of which have a greater or lesser degree of yellow in their plumage. On top of that there are American Goldfinches, Pine Siskins, Orioles, Meadowlarks, Yellow-headed Blackbirds, Grosbeaks, Tanagers and of course Vireos. The list goes on with varying amounts of yellow. What is it about yellow? Could it be to do with courtship, making birds easier to see in the foliage? I'm not sure but it certainly is not the case in England.

Yellow Warblers are now singing a rather boring song, which is one

of the few that I managed to commit to memory. Like many of the birds they come for the insects, particularly mosquitoes, because of the vast amounts of standing freshwater. As I write the mosquitoes are just beginning to appear, although there should be fewer because many areas have dried up. I am one of those people who seems to attract them, so spend half my year trying to discourage them and not return from daily trips covered in painful lumps.

Because of the mosquitoes there are large numbers and varieties of flycatchers: Swallows, Martins, Kingbirds and even Hummingbirds. Around Wing and in much of England, because so much insecticide is used in agriculture, bird populations have crashed...no food no birds. Every day during summer here it is a daily ritual to debug the car windscreen - something not done in England since I was child.

Continuing the yellow theme the Lady's Slipper orchids have just appeared in the roadside ditches, joining the masses of Dandelions and Common Blanket flower.

The first of the butterflies are now on the wing and of course, as you might guess, the most notable are yellow. Clouded Sulphur are much like the Clouded Yellows that can be found around Wing most years in the

autumn. Swallowtails, and particularly the Canadian Tiger Swallowtail, seem to be everywhere as I write.

The British Swallowtail (and I mean 'British', a unique subspecies) unfortunately can only be found in the Fens of Norfolk and Suffolk.

As far as animals are concerned, bear warnings are everywhere with updates each week of their whereabouts. Mothers are now out with this year's cubs, which were born during the winter. They are often along the roadsides devouring the copious amounts of dandelions. I saw my first Black Bear doing just that last week.

I'm sure you are aware that it is fire season here in Canada. There are currently some 200 fires and I heard today that the smoke has now reached the UK. Some are covering vast areas and, with strong winds, are proving difficult to get under control. Like the ones on Dartmoor and in Scotland they destroy some of the most threatened habitats and wildlife, which we cannot afford.

As a closing note, and very pleasing to me, a UK government proposal. No matter your allegiance to whatever political party, Ed Miliband's proposal surely makes sense that all new houses, with few exceptions, are to have solar panels. To me this can only be good news and it's about time. I wait to see if this is carried through.

# A message from

Laura Kyrke-Smith

I am delighted to write for the latest edition of *What's On In Wing* as your Member of Parliament for Aylesbury and the villages.

On 8 May, our communities came together to mark the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE Day. On 3 May, I was honoured to join His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of Buckinghamshire, veterans, serving sea cadets and many others at the VE Day celebrations at the Discover Bucks Museum. Thank you to the organisers, including Aylesbury Town Council and the Aylesbury branch of the Royal British Legion.

Earlier this year, I was appointed by the Prime Minister to be a Parliamentary Private Secretary to the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, Steve Reed MP. In Parliament I have continued to champion the interests of Wing residents.

I am pleased our Government is bringing forward action to tackle fly tipping. Last year, there were more than 4,000 incidents of fly-tipping in Buckinghamshire.

Councils currently have to bear the significant cost of seizing and storing vehicles but under new plans, being considered by Ministers, fly-tippers will cover this cost, saving councils and taxpayers money.

Any criminals caught transporting and dealing with waste illegally will face up to five years in prison under new legislation. The Government is making available £69 billion to council budgets across England to help fund key responsibilities like tackling fly-tipping.

We need change locally. From housing to SEND, from social care to potholes and pavements, Wing residents raise their frustrations with me regularly. I remain committed to working with Councillors of all parties to serve residents and improve our town and villages for the better.

This month we've been keeping busy getting up to date with maintenance. We've been getting tracks levelled and ready for the harvest months, and we're still cleaning and blowing out the grain store, ready for the corn. The winter barley has been changing colour and the combine will be out very soon!

We had some very good news on the cattle front with a clear TB test. It's been a very difficult seven months with re-testing the cattle every 60 days. This new clear test means we don't need to re-test the herd for six months. Recently we had to test which meant getting all the stock in from the fields and into the sheds for a week. It's safe to say they were not happy about it! Lots of protesting moos and a few escaped calves out the sheds added stress to the week!

But now that we're TB clear we can sell to our local market, which is Thame. The choice of livestock markets has reduced dramatically over the years. Not so long ago, in addition to Thame, we could choose Leighton Buzzard, Winslow, Banbury, Aylesbury, Northampton and others. The only practical alternatives to Thame today are Rugby or Thrapston, neither of them what you would call local.

With the weather looking hot we will be looking to make hay. Getting hay right can be tricky. Once it's cut, it has to dry in the wind and sun, then be turned, until it's ready for the baler. The hay should ideally be 14% moisture content. Anything more can cause problems with mouldy hay, or bales can even combust, especially when packed tightly into the



shed. - and if it gets rained on, we then have to wait again for good drying weather.

But we are lucky, as it's a fairly easy operation compared to the old days. My father talks about when all the hay was in small bales, hand balling every one of them into a shed. They'd collect and stack around 25,000 bales - must have been hard work on a hot day!

The development of farming technology has been fantastic, from better machinery to better ideas (and bigger bales), making farmers' work easier and more efficient. I count myself lucky as I live in the time where I don't have to hand-collect 25,000 bales!

# CARE CENTRE TO RE-OPEN SOON

#### You'll see from the advertisement in this issue that Wing View Care Centre is planning to open for guests this summer - which must mean soon.

It's great news. Carey Lodge, as the centre was known previously, struggled to recruit senior management and closed in late 2021. The village felt the absence of an important village facility. Now part of the Orders of St John Care Trust, Wing View Care Centre has been refreshed and revived, and is set to renew its role at the heart of our community. Has the wait been worthwhile?

Wing View will cater for a wide range of needs. It's been designed as four households, each with a different specialist focus: dementia care, residential care, respite care and day care. Each household has its own care team, sitting room and dining room, so residents can enjoy more of a home-from-home experience.

The centre has accommodation for up to 75 residents, each with a spacious bedroom/sitting room with its own wet-room shower facilities. There's a private dining and entertainment room, a hairdressers and beauty





salon, cosy lounges, and open garden spaces and terraces with seating areas. There's even a café bar, open to the public.

Round-the-clock care will be provided by a friendly, professionally trained team, supported by a visiting doctor and chiropodist. Dedicated Activity Coordinators help organise coffee mornings, trips and excursions, birthday parties, arts and crafts, individual pursuits, concerts, seated yoga and barbecues. Other activities include church services, school visits (Wing View is next door to both Overstone Combined School and Wing Secondary School). Wing View will even have its own minibus.

Wing View will also boast a talented chef and kitchen team, providing balanced diets, based on seasonal foods and daily-changing menus, with constant availability of snacks and drinks.

Wing View's stated aim is to ensure that all residents enjoy a fulfilling and independent lifestyle, with care tailored to their individual needs.

# **Meet our new Councillors**

With elections now behind us, our two Councillors for the new Buckinghamshire Council ward of Bierton, Kingsbrook and Wing are Cllrs Julie Ward (Conservative) and Kathy Gibbon (Reform).

The business of Council has got underway with appointments being agreed and Chair places elected. Buckinghamshire Council sees a change in Leader following the election of Cllr Steven Broadbent. Cllr Julie Ward has been appointed to the new Cabinet with a role as Deputy Cabinet Member for Resources, focusing on Town Centre Regeneration and appearing at Finances & Resources Select Committees. Cllr Kathy Gibbon has been appointed to serve on the Pension Fund Committee and Senior Appointments and Pay Committee.

Priorities for the new Council will include the development of the new Local Plan, something that will touch the lives of all Buckinghamshire residents in one way or another. It was therefore good to attend the recent Parish Council public consultation exercise in Wing relating to the Neighbourhood Plan, where Julie was able to meet residents and listen to their views on the future for Wing.

On a broader front, we have just seen the outcome of the Government's Spending Review and the response from Buckinghamshire Council has not been positive, with no clear answers on services such as SEND and Adult Social Care. The review falls short where Local Government is concerned and Buckinghamshire Council is committed to continue to press for funding for the services our residents rely on.

Locally, we have seen further closure of the A418 into Aylesbury for the resurfacing of the road through Bierton as part of this Council's record £120m investment in our roads. There is no doubt that the work needed undertaking and night time closure was seen as the least disruptive method for delivery. given the impact long periods of closure has already had on residents using this road.

Using newly adopted civil powers, Buckinghamshire Council has issued it's first fines to people captured in the act of littering from vehicles. We are

now able to issue £500.00 penalty notices, so please, if you have dash cam footage of people littering our communities, do send it to us.

Buckinghamshire Council has conducted a successful partnership operation with teams across Parking Enforcement, Fraud, Blue Badge, along with Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs), coming together to tackle the misuse of Blue Badges.

The enforcement initiative focussed on identifying and addressing the abuse of Blue Badge permits, along with educating motorists on the inappropriate use of disabled bays.

The operation coincided with the national Blue Badge Day of Action on 30 May, when local authorities across the country united in a collective effort to tackle misuse of the scheme.

During the operation, a total of 151 Blue Badges were inspected. As a result, 23 Penalty Charge Notices (PCNs) were issued.

Investigations are ongoing, and prosecutions may follow where appropriate.

Finally, we would like to conclude this month by saying that we look forward to meeting as many of you as possible over the forthcoming months.

July is a good time to lift and divide any old, congested clumps of Bearded Iris. The picture above is a variety called Braithwaite and is very striking when in full flower. They originate from the Mediterranean region and are very drought tolerant. They are a good plant for the front of the border to allow their rhizomes (the brown knobbly lump that sends up spiky leaves) to bake in the sun. Gently lift the clump out of the soil with a fork and then separate the younger pieces of rhizome, discarding the old pieces. Reduce the foliage to about 15cm from the root in a fan shape. This reduces the water loss from the leaves and prevents the plant being blown over in strong winds until it can get its roots down. It can then be replanted in a shallow hole, leaving the top of the rhizome at ground level. Water well after dividing, especially if we have very hot weather.

Oriental poppies can be completely cut to the ground now they have finished flowering. It's a good idea to give them some water and they should send up a new flush of leaves. I want to expand my number of Oriental poppies, but the seeds don't tend to come true. I'll be taking root cuttings from these in autumn once the plant is dormant. To take root cuttings you dig the plant up and cut a  $4^{\circ}$  length of root that is about pencil thickness (don't take more than a third of the plant's root system) and then replant the parent plant. Pop the root into a pot of gritty compost to allow for good drainage. Water - and wait for signs of life.

Continue dead heading roses to encourage more blooms. I will be using a liquid feed from time to time to bolster the flower production. I've found liquid feeds better to use with an inquisitive dog around, but these are not quite as effective or long lasting as granular feeds.

Keep on top of watering in the vegetable garden to ensure good harvests. I'm trying onions again in the vegetable garden – a sweet variety called Walla Walla. These should be getting close to being ready. I'll lift them when the green foliage turns yellow and starts to flop. I've not grown onions for a while as the last crop all had white rot (a fungal disease that affects onions, garlic and leeks) which tends to remain in the soil for quite a few years.

This month I'll be sowing Cavolo Nero (Italian black kale) and Swiss chard. I sow these in modules and grow on ready to transplant in August. We should be able to harvest some leaves later in the autumn and then early spring. Another sowing of beetroot and dwarf beans can be made this month ready to plant out for late beans.

Dwarf bean germination this year has been absolutely dreadful. Two sowings in modules failed, either by rotting or perhaps mice? I then

resorted to chitting between damp pieces of paper towel and ... major success! They sprout roots within a couple of days and can be planted into modules for growing on. I'm now learning to grow into more sizeable plants before planting out to try and deter slugs. The courgettes were planted out with plastic halos and copper tape and then lots of crushed eggshells around the stems. We'll see if they work. The scouring pads that I used last year are back out and looks as though they've worked again.

Our speaker for the July 8th meeting will be Kathryn Clover on Foraging. Sounds interesting.

### Overstone Combined School Celebrates 175 Years of History

On Wednesday, 4<sup>th</sup> June, Overstone Combined School proudly opened its doors to parents, grandparents, members of the community, former pupils and staff to celebrate the 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the very first Overstone School.

To mark this special occasion, the school was transformed into a living timeline, showcasing key historical events from 1850 to the present day. Teachers, teaching assistants and pupils worked collaboratively to research, create, and present a journey through time, offering visitors an engaging and educational experience.



Year Six – 1850–1880. Year Six pupils brought the Victorian era to life by acting out notable events. A standout feature was a replica air raid shelter, inspired by the one that once stood on the school grounds.

As everyone enjoyed their refreshments, the school choir performed assembly favourites, including He's Got the Whole World in His Hands and Sing Hosanna.

We have at least six defibrillators in Wing - here's how to access some of them. A defibrillator is a device that give a pulse of energy to the heart. It helps get the heart beating again when someone has suffered cardiac arrest and their heart has stopped. Defibrillators are commonly called defibs, or AEDs (Automatic External Defibrillators), or PADs (Public Access Defibrillators).

Defibs can be very effective first aid for cases of cardiac arrest. The sooner they are used, the greater chance they have of saving a life, so knowing the location of the nearest defib can make a big difference. Using CPR (chest compressions and rescue breaths) and a defib can double, or even as much as quadruple, the chances of survival.

You can call 999. If you know your location, the operator will tell you where to find the nearest device.

You can check on-line. There are several websites and apps. However, most of them depend on the providers of the defibs to identify themselves. We haven't found any app or website that shows all the defibs in Wing, but the best website so far is called defibfinder.co.uk.

#### Using a defibrillator

Anyone can use a defibrillator. You do not need training. Once you turn it on, it will give clear step-by-step voice instructions. Many defibrillators also have visual prompts and images showing how to use it. The device checks the person's heart rhythm and will only tell you to give them a shock if it's needed. You cannot shock yourself or someone else accidentally.

### **Dealing with Hay Fever**

Hay fever season is in full swing, and if you're one of the millions who start sneezing the second the flowers bloom or the grass gets cut, you'll know exactly how irritating (and sometimes debilitating) it can be. But there is some good news - there are some simple things you can do (and eat) to make the whole experience a little more bearable.

So, firstly, what exactly is hay fever? It's actually just your immune system reacting to pollen. When you breathe pollen in, your body reacts and releases histamines, which are natural chemicals produced by your immune system as part of your defence mechanism. It is these histamines that cause a runny nose, watery eyes, sneezing, and an irritated throat.

So if you suffer, what can you do to make things better? Over-thecounter antihistamines like cetirizine or loratadine are the obvious first line of defence, especially if you take them before your symptoms kick in. You can also use nasal sprays and eye drops which can help soothe inflammation and stop an itchy nose or eyes. But what about more natural remedies?

There are certain foods that can actually help ease symptoms and calm your immune response to pollen. These foods are rich in quercetin (basically nature's antihistamine) and they are apples (especially the skin), onions, kale, broccoli, nuts, asparagus, tea and some berries. Although strawberries and raspberries actually contain histamines (but the verdict is out on whether these are bad to eat for hay fever sufferers!) maybe avoid these when you're at your worst.

Vitamin C is another hay fever hero. It's a natural antihistamine, and it helps reduce inflammation. So load up on citrus fruits, kiwi, and red peppers. These also give your immune system a nice little boost too. And if you love spicy food, things like chilli peppers and horseradish can



actually help clear out your sinuses.

Also, don't underestimate the power of local honey. The theory is that eating a bit of honey made from local pollen helps your body gradually build tolerance. It's a bit controversial and studies are mixed, but

there's no harm in giving it a go.

Probiotics are worth mentioning too. A healthy gut supports a calmer immune system, so foods like yogurt, kefir, sauerkraut and miso might help tone down your allergic reactions.

Beyond the plate, here are a few non-food tricks. Keep your windows shut on high-pollen days, and shower after being outside to wash the pollen off your skin and hair. Sunglasses help to shield your eyes, and maybe try some Vaseline around your nostrils to trap pollen before it can be inhaled.

So while hay fever season can be a bit miserable, there's no need to suffer in silence. A few tweaks to your diet and daily habits might really help, so why don't you give some of them a try?

# Friends You Would Rather Not Have!

#### Fleas

The most common external parasite affecting dogs are fleas. Not only do they enjoy feeding off the dog's blood, but they will quite happily feed off humans too, and these bites cause skin conditions that are very irritating.



Skin problems are one of the most common causes of trips to the vets. Once the dog has a flea infestation it is necessary to take action to treat the dog, its bedding and your home, as these little critters love a cosy environment. Generally, fleas are passed on from contact with other infected dogs or animals, such as foxes or rabbits, and they can live in carpets or bedding for quite a long period of time. There are several different options to remove fleas. Medicated from your yet and applied directly to the skin, or

products can be obtained from your vet and applied directly to the skin, or taken in tablet form. Alternative, natural products, are also effective and can be added to the dog's food on a daily basis - products like 'Billy no Mates', a herbal remedy option.

#### Lice

There are two types of lice, biting lice which feed off the skin of their host and sucking lice that feed on blood. These lice are different from human lice but, similarly, they glue their eggs (nits) to the strands of hair. It is these eggs that are most noticeable to the human eye, although they can be mistaken for dandruff. The lice themselves are very small and often unseen. Lice will attach to any part of the body and a severe infestation of the sucking lice can result in the dog suffering from severe anaemia, which would need to be treated with nutritional supplements and iron in a well-balanced diet. An affected dog will need to be shampooed weekly with a specially medicated shampoo to clear their coat.



Spraying their bedding and sleeping area as well as any grooming equipment is also necessary.

#### Mites

There are several types of mites, but the two common types are

demodectic mites and ear mites, both of which are rarely visible to the naked eye. Demodectic mites aren't contagious and they live in the hair follicles, favouring around the eyes and feet. These mites cause crusty red dry skin and hair loss. Generally they are passed from the mother to the pups at an early age. Ear mites affect the



dog's ears, causing them to shake their heads a lot and constantly scratching them. The inside of the ear will be inflamed and an unpleasant smell with be noticed along with a dark discharge. These mites can be tackled with medicated ear drops, which are an effective treatment.

### Ticks

Ticks are about 2-5mm in length, but can swell to many times this size

when they have gorged on blood. They will attach themselves to any part of the dog but particularly like to be around the ears or between the toes. Once the tick has jumped onto the dog it will bury its head into the skin and start to feed on blood. Ticks carry infectious diseases like Lyme disease which is dangerous to both dogs and humans. The



best way to remove a tick is to use a little gadget which looks like a bent fork. By slipping the body of the tick between the prongs and gently twisting you can remove the head along with the body. Once the whole tick has been removed, treat the local area with antiseptic.

### Ashridge House & Golden Valley

Starting from the stunning Ashridge House this is a medium level walk through valleys and woodland with some great views over the Hertfordshire countryside along the way.



Park in the car park at the front of Ashridge House.

Exit the car park and walk down hill, on the footpath parallel to the road and away from Ashridge House, following the footpath toward a white bar gate ahead.

Where the road bears left, continue along the footpath and down into Golden Valley straight ahead.

At the bottom of the valley turn right and walk along the valley for about 1/4 mile, to where it narrows.

► Ignore the waymarker signs on left and take the bridle path uphill on the right. Continue along this path, walking past standing deadwood tree on the left until reaching a gate.

► Go through the gate and continue along the bridle path until arriving at a wooden gate in the hedgerow ahead. Go through this gate and follow the path through a small wood until reaching a metalled side road.

► Walk down this road, crossing over College Road to the small car park opposite. From the car park exit at the top left corner and follow a narrow footpath which emerges into an open field.

► Walk up the hill, keeping the small wood ahead to the right until reaching a fork in the footpath. Take the path to the right in the direction of an earth mound ahead and continue until reaching the woods.





Enter the woods following the bridle path, and at the junction take the route on the right, continuing through the woods, emerging at a clearing with Wood Cutters cottages to the left.

► Take the wide gravel road on the immediate right for several hundred yards. Where the road bends sharply to the right, on the left is a wooden gate and two footpaths. Take the footpath to the right leading uphill.

► Keep the fenced field to the left, turn at the corner of the fenced field and continue along the footpath until reaching a footpath crossroad. Take the footpath to the right and at the footpath T junction turn right and continue through the woods until reaching College Road by Ashridge House.

Cross over the road, follow the footpath back to the car park and enjoy a light post walk snack in the Bakehouse café in the courtyard.

Anyone who has ever tried to grow courgettes knows that they need to be harvested regularly. Look away or blink and they become marrows!So, as there is only so much ratatouille and barbecued courgettes that any family wants, here are a couple of alternative recipes.

### A Salad (2 portions)

#### **Ingredients:**

2 courgettes, cut in half lengthways, then into ¼ inch slices 6 spring onions, sliced 2tbsp butter 1 yellow pepper, diced 100g/4oz halloumi cheese, cubed 8 cherry tomatoes, halved Some salad leaves Fresh basil leaves torn into quarters Grated rind and juice of half a lemon Black pepper Olive oil

### Courgettes are here again

#### Method:

Melt the butter in a frying pan, add the courgettes, spring onions and pepper. Fry until just tender. Add the halloumi and cook until the cheese is slightly browned. Meanwhile, in a separate pan lightly cook the tomatoes.

Arrange the salad leaves and half the basil onto plates. Spoon the warm vegetables and cheese onto the leaves. Top with remaining basil, some black pepper, lemon rind and juice and some olive oil. Serve with fresh bread or pittas.

### Courgettes & Mushrooms with Crème Fraiche

(a side dish, 4 portions)

#### **Ingredients:**

900g/2lb courgettesSalt &Olive oil225g2-3tbsp crème fraicheJuice

Salt & pepper 225g/8oz mushrooms Juice of half a lemon

#### Method:

Heat the oven to Gas 6/200°C/400°F.

Slice the courgettes thinly and layer them into a baking tray.

Sprinkle with salt, pepper and a drizzle of olive oil and roast in the oven for 20 minutes.

Slice the mushrooms, add them to the courgettes and bake for another 10 minutes.

Stir in the crème fraiche and heat on the hob until the mixture is bubbling.

Sprinkle with lemon juice and serve hot.
